ANOTHER THEORY ON OUR NAME

Hi Leroy received your E-Mail a few days ago but had some problems with my computer, hopefully they are all ok now, I was just messing around on the internet the other night when I came across the Deadman web sight and I was fascinated, anyway let me tell you about myself I am 43 years old born 09-07-56 I am at the moment a Cabin Crew member for British Airways but I have had many jobs and different trades since I left school. 2 years ago I decided to go back into education and studied for an Advanced education diploma in Anatomy and Physiology and Bio Mechanics, which I achieved and applied to Oxford University and am now happy to say that I am now on a Bachelor of Science Degree course in Osteopathy, I am at present studying for my end of year exams, so as you can imagine I am very busy. Let me tell you what I know about the Deadman family, which is limited to what has been handed down from father to son over the years. I am one of 5 boys and an identical twin we were a military family, my Father Brian William Deadman was a Sargent in the Parachute regiment along with with my 4 brothers David, Peter, John and my twin Lawrence, unfortunately David and I are the only survivors as the regiment takes a big toll on families, (tours of Ireland etc.) I didn't go into the regiment and instead went to sea as a steward on passenger liners and had a great time ending up as first class steward on the MV Sun Princess (Love Boat) Cruising 6 months in the Caribbean 2 months Panama Canal and 4 months in Canada and Alaska. My Dad was one of two boys his Brothers name was Dennis and he Died at Arnham during the second world war. My Grandad's name was Joseph Deadman and he was married to Amelia whose maiden name was Herbert one of two sisters, My Grandad by all accounts was a real character and this is where we go into a darker side of the Deadman family ! in the 1940s he was a black shirt and a fully fledged member of the British Nazi party one of (Mosley's men) and apparently spent time behind bars for his beliefs, I didn't know him as he died when I was very young, but my Grandmother told us that our family originated from up north and that we can trace our family history back to the earliest Kings and Queens of England and around the 14th Century we were brought to London as Executioners and at the time of the great plague of London our family was commissioned to burn and bury the bodies at Graves End and Blackheath, there was a great deal of research done by my Uncle but unfortunately this has been lost over the years, but one day when I have finished my studies I intend to spend some time finding out all of our secrets, I found out something uncanny a couple of years ago about the house I now live in which I purchased 6 years ago, the house was built in 1928 and the first owner was called Mr. Deadman! I know that a lot of what I have told you is unsubstantiated but when I have the facts you will be the first to know. In the Mailbag

Here is the summary of the info on John H. Dedman that I have taken from copies of documents. He enlisted in the Confederate Army on Sept. 2, 1862 in Lexington, KY. He was enlisted by Brig. Gen. Buford for a period of three years. His name appears on the Company Muster Roll of Company I, Grigsbys Regiment, 6th Cavalry, Ky. This regiment was formed about Feb. 1, 1863 by the consolidation of Grigsbys and Bullitts Battalions, Kentucky Cavalry. He was reported captured at Camp Nelson, Tenn. This later appears in two other documents as Camp Nelson, Mercer Co. Ky. He was captured Aug. 19, 1863 and discharged (sent) to Camp Morton, Indianapolis, IN. Coincidentally he was reported as a deserter on Aug. 19, 1863 and his name appears on a roll of deserters of Aug. 25, 1863. He was received as a POW at Camp Morton, Ind. IN on Aug. 29, 1863. His name appears on a list of POWs sent to Louisville, Ky. military prison from Camp Nelson Ky. Under remarks it says he gave himself up. On a roll of prisoners at Camp Morton his name appears as one who desires to take the Oath of Allegiance to the Union, Sept. 7, 1863. He signed the Oath at Camp Morton Ind. In on the 26th of November, 1864 having spent a little more than a year as a POW. Note: A remark entered on the Company Muster roll states "name appears in a column of names present as John Deadman". All other documents carry his name and any signatures as John H. Dedman. I am inclined to believe that the Deadman spelling was done in error by a clerk or copyist. I also believe that the reference to Camp Nelson, Tenn. is in error since it is hand written and later printed documents all refer to Camp Nelson, Mercer Co. Ky. I am personally familiar with Camp Nelson Ky. but do not know of a Camp Nelson, Tenn.

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For anyone interested in the Dedman, Robards, Kerby lines. This is an excerpt from a letter of a cousin describing a visit to this cemetery several years ago. On Wednesday, August 9, 1992 I visited the former home of John Henry Dedman and Sarah Jane Robards Dedman. The home is located in Woodford Co. Ky. on the McCrackin Turnpike. The home is now owned by Mr. David A Sutherland. The home and 116 acre farm are now known as "Mount Ararat Farm" but it has been previously known as "Thor's Farm" Mr. Sutherland purchased the farm in 1938 from his father and an uncle. It is a working farm with about 100 head of beef cattle, several horses, turkeys, and peacocks. Mr. Sutherland allowed that he was "less than 100 years old". I guess him to be in his early 80's. The Robards cemetery is 15.2 miles from Versailles cemetery via rt. 33 and Mundys Landing road. Take rt. 33 12.6 miles south to Mundys Landing road . Mundys Landing road goes straight as rt. 33 turns left. Follow Mundys Landing road 2.4 miles to a dirt/gravel lane on right. Follow the dirt lane about 2/10 of a mile to an open field. Drive into the field about 25 yards, turn left. Cemetery is about 200 yards up the hill. Headstones with names, birth and death dates of the following are readable. Several stones bear no markings and some stones appear to be missing. In addition to these listed ones there are a few others buried here that cannot be related to the Robards, Dedmans or Kerbys at this time. In all there are 19 spaces which are thought to be burial sites. Andrew L. Robards, b.Oct.1,1789 d. May 19,1859 L.T. Robards, b.Dec.18,1856 d. July14, 1857 M.B. Robards, b. Apr.18,1852 d. July 15, 1857 Catherine Robards, b. Jan. 24,1860 d. Jan. 24,1861 J.L. Robards, b.Oct. 5, 1847 d. Mar. 17, 1859 L.A. Robards, b.May 17, 1819 d. July 5, 1876 Polly A. wife of L.A., b.Feb. 1, 1828, d.Feb.28, 1905 Wilkerson T. Robards, b. 1860 d. 1912 D.B. Robards b. 1860, d. Nov. 22, 1883 W.D. Robards, b. July 26, 1858 d. Oct. 23, 1884 Elizabeth Kerby, b. Feb. 5, 1807 d. Apr. 3, 1895 Now, some 7 years later, the condition of the cemetery is unknown as is the certainty of the farm ownership. There is a possibility that I may be able to visit the location in August and if I do I will report my findings. Meanwhile if anyone in the Woodford Co. area knows of this site please let me know.

Bill, I can give you some more info re: Kathy's letter which was printed in the April/May issue of the "Dedmon Connection". What Kathy found on the LDS site was the first few generations of the Christopher Deadman line (my ancestors). Wanda Colvin has done a great amount of research on the Christopher Deadman line and in 1983 she published a book, "The Dedman Genealogy with Allied Families". There were 2 Samuels in the early (4th and 5th) generations but I do not believe either of them are the same as Samuel Dedman of Louisa and Albemarle Counties. Most of the following information is proven. I will give you a brief, brief outline of the info from Wanda's book. Christopher Deadman of York Co., VA, c.1620-1679 w: Ann (Alice) Martin Phillip Deadman/Dedman, Sr. of York Co., VA, c.1655-1721 w: Mary ???? Phillip Dedman, Jr. of York Co., VA, c.1700-1770 w: Margaret Langston Samuel Dedman of York Co. and Mecklenburg Co., VA, c.1750-1789 w: Eleanor Howard Children of Samuel and Eleanor Dedman: Henry H. Dedman, 1772-1825 Samuel Dedman, c.1773-1808 b: York Co., VA d: Mecklenburg Co., VA No known marriages or children Elenor Dedman White, 1775-?? John Dedman, 1776-1835 Phillip Dedman, 1779-1852 Francis Dedman, 1787-186? William Dedman, 1780-18?? Thomas Dedman, ?????? Howard Dedman, 1785-1803 There is a lot more about these generations in Wanda's book. You might want to check with your library and request it via interlibrary loan. So it appears that in the late 1700's there were at least 3 Samuel Dedmans in Virginia and the older two gentlemen, Samuel Dedman of York and Mecklenburg Co., and, Samuel Dedman of Ablemarle, were both fairly active in their local politics. There are some differences between the LDS info, as printed in the Dedmon Connection, and Wanda's research. I plan to go into the LDS files ASAP and do a personal comparison of the info.
