JOHN GLENN, AMERICAN HERO OF THE SPACE AGE, DIES AT 95

John Glenn, a freckle-faced son of Ohio who was hailed as a national hero and a symbol of the space age as the first American to orbit Earth, then became a national political figure for 24 years in the Senate, died on Thursday, December 8, in Columbus, OH. He was 95. Ohio State University announced his death. Mr. Glenn had recently been hospitalized at the university at the James Cancer Center, though Ohio State officials said at the time that admission there did not necessarily mean he had cancer. He had heart-valve replacement surgery in 2014 and a stroke around that time. He had kept an office at the John Glenn College of Public Affairs, which he helped found, and also had a home in Columbus. In just five hours on Feb. 20, 1962, Mr. Glenn joined a select roster of Americans whose feats have seized the country's imagination and come to embody a moment in its history, figures like Lewis and Clark, the Wright brothers and Charles Lindbergh.



When I heard of John Glenn's death, I could not help but think of my time on Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Alabama. For four years I worked as a draftsman for NASA on the Saturn Missile Project. Although we knew the missile was supposed to be the vehicle to take man to the moon, we often wondered if it would happen. I left the project in June of 1963 to pursue my career in the ministry, before it actually happened. (LD)



FAA RECOGNIZES RONALD SCOTT DEADMAN

Arlington-based pilot sets positive example

The FAA hopes new pilot training standards will enhance airline safety. The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) is recognizing Ronald Scott Deadman with inclusion in the prestigious FAA Airmen Certification Database. The database, which appears on the agency's website at www.faa.gov, names Deadman and other certified pilots who have met or exceeded the high educational, licensing and medical standards established by the FAA. Pilot certification standards have evolved over time in an attempt to reduce pilot errors that lead to fatal crashes. FAA standards, which are set in consultation with the aviation industry and the public, are among the highest in the world.

Transportation safety experts strongly recommend against flying with an uncertified pilot. FAA pilot certification can be the difference between a safe flight and one that ends in tragedy. The FAA recently announced that it is increasing the qualification requirements for co-pilots who fly for U.S. passenger and cargo airlines. These requirements mandate additional minimum flight time and training, as well as aircraft specific training.

"Safety will be my overriding priority as Secretary, so I am especially pleased to mark my first week by announcing a rule that will help us maintain our unparalleled safety record," said Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx in a press release. "We owe it to the traveling public to have only the most qualified and best trained pilots."

THE DEDMAN CEMETERY

Of the 15 Revolutionary War soldiers buried in Pike County, IN, one is buried just outside of Winslow near the Charity Farm alongside a forgotten road bed. Nestled right against the edge of the spoil banks and a strip mine pit is the small overgrown Dedman Cemetery, spared by the coal mines in the early 1900s. Amongst the wild blackberry brambles and century old devils darn needles lies Samuel Dedman, the patriarch of the Dedman family in Pike County, buried here on what was once his land.

Dedman Family Cemetery The first time I visited this cemetery I was maybe 11 years old. We lived near it and my brothers and I followed all of the paths winding through the woods. I was captivated by old cemeteries even then. I spent hours there, wondering who they were, how they had lived & died, and studying their monuments as if they would tell me their secrets. Only five graves are visibly marked.

Samuel Dedman was born March 17, 1748 in Louisa County, Virginia to Samuel Dedman, Sr. and Mary Elizabeth Dixon. He had siblings: John, Richmond, Sarah, Mary, Nancy, Susan, Nathan, Bartlett and Dixon. In 1749, his father purchased a farm in Louisa County, Virginia. In 1769, he sold it and moved the family to Albemarle County, Virginia where he bought 200 acres of land in the Ragged Mountains from William T. Lewis, a mile below the Reservoir south of Charlottesville, Virginia, and not far from Moses Clack, Sr. Samuel



Dedman was a signer of the Albemarle Declaration of Independence written by his neighbor, Thomas Jefferson. (Whether Samuel or his father is unknown) His father died in 1800. Samuel and his siblings had all moved west by 1828. His father's will mentions land, Negroes, money and tobacco, denoting some wealth. A fine punch bowl and a small distillery on the farm were also worthy of mention.

Samuel married Mary Fields, daughter of John Fields. In the Will of John Fields, 1789: I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Dedman & her husband Samuel Dedman three negroes named Fan Young, Phillis & Winney to them & their heirs forever. Samuel and Mary had children: Sarah Fields Dedman, Elijah Dixon Dedman, William Dedman, Polly Dedman, and Mary Dedman.

The Dedman's were soldiers. There are stories of four Dedman brothers serving in the Revolutionary War. The Dedman's in Pike County provided many sons to the Civil War. Descendents have served in each of the more recent wars. In 1777 at the age of 29, Samuel enlisted for a term of 3 years at Albemarle Virginia in the Company commanded by Capt. John Marks of the 14th Virginia Regiment commanded by Col. Charles Lewis of the Virginia Line. He was a non commissioned officer and a Sergeant, in the Continental Line.

By 1788, he was in Fayette County, Kentucky on the Kentucky Census. He was a Baptist and a ruling elder at Clear Creek Baptist Church in 1788. In 1793 he and Mary were dismissed from Bryan's Station Baptist Church in Fayette County, Kentucky. He is also found in Montgomery and Shelby Counties in Kentucky. He had moved to his home Pike County by 1819, when he applied for his Revolutionary War Pension. He is listed on the Pike County census of 1820, along with sons William and Elijah. By 1830, his son William had opened a millinery shop in Petersburg and Elijah had moved on. Mary died in 1820 and Samuel died in 1834. His grave is marked by the DAR, but I remember when I was a child he had an old stone. Maybe it is buried there.

Also buried in the cemetery is John Ellsworth Dedman, son of William, grandson of Samuel. John E. was born Dec. 2, 1807 and died at 47 years of age Jan. 5, 1855, leaving his widow, Cynthia Traylor Dedman to raise 8 children alone. Their neighbor, George Dean who also died later in the year of 1855,



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was responsible for willing the proceeds of the Winslow Charity Farm to compensate widows who met certain conditions. Perhaps Cynthia was one of the reasons for the trust.



Amanda M.O. Dedman, who died in 1849 at the age of 22, is a mystery. Whose daughter was she or who was she married to? Would the O stand for Oliver, maybe someone Oliver Perry was named for?

Little Viola Dedman, who died at the age of two, was the daughter of Thomas

and granddaughter of John Ellsworth Dedman. She was born in 1859 and died March 27, 1861. She was aged 1 year, 6 months and 1 day. She was the daughter of Thomas and Sarah Dedman. If I remember correctly there was a lamb carved into this



tombstone.



Oliver Perry Dedman, son of John Ellsworth, has a civil war marker on his grave. It has deteriorated to the point you can hardly read it. Oliver Perry served the Union with the 24th Regiment, Indiana Infantry. He enlisted as a Private and mustered out as a Corporal. He was born in 1843 and his death is unknown.

In Samuel's Pension application of 1819, many details of his life emerge. His Pension is #S 35887. He was awarded \$8.00 per month. He served in the battles of Brandywine, German Town and Monmouth. They moved horses from Petersburg to Albemarle. He had lost his discharge papers, but friends and others he served with vouched for him. Some years ago, his situation was prosperous, but he found himself in reduced circumstances later in life. He entered two quarters of land at Vincennes and had paid the first installments on it. He had a usable stock of hogs and little other property, and he owed \$1800.00 which was more than his property was worth. He was in his 70th

year and due to bodily injuries could not earn a substance from labor. His wife, Mary, 7 years older than he, had been blind for fourteen years. She could knit a little, but could do nothing to support the family. They lived with their son and one orphaned grandson, Elijah Jerrell, son of their daughter Sarah Fields Dedman and Walter Jerrell. His personal property consisted of: one old mare, one cow, ten grown hogs, twenty nine pigs, six sows, seven shoats, large pots, small pot, one skillet, one tea kettle, cupboard, one four square poplar table, one axe, and one hoe. He was a farmer. He lost a valuable drove of cattle to a fatal distemper known as the Bloody Murrur after having gotten them to market.

My stepgrandfather, John C. Evans, was a descendent of Samuel Dedman. Rowena Dedman Evans was his grandmother, married to Andrew Leonard Evans. Her line was through Samuel Fields Dedman, William Dedman, and then Samuel Dedman. -Rose

I do not know who Rose is, other than what she gives in the above article, but I appreciate the fine work she did on putting this article together. It is difficult to imagine a pension of \$8.00 a month. That was just 200 years ago, but it brought to mind my salary of \$40.00 per week just 50 years ago. However, groceries were only 10.00 a week and rent was 40.00 a month. That left enough to pay the utilities and even splurge now and then at the Krystal for a ten cent hamburger. It has been a long time since I pulled up to a gas pump and told the attendant to put in a dollars worth. If you spent that much he would check the oil and tires and wash the windshield. If I remember correctly you had to make at least two trips to the car to carry in 10.00 worth of groceries. I thought about that the other day when I carried 100.00 worth in one trip.

Our Backs are Against THE BRICK WALL

AFRICAN- AMERICAN DEDMONS

From the onset of my family research project I have had numerous inquiries concerning the connection to Afrcan-American family members. I have corresponded with several and have a good number of Facebook friends. Most are agreed the surname came through the slave days. Although not proud of that fact, many of the Deadman family of all spelling variations were slave owners.

It was not unusual for the slaves to take the surname of thier masters. (I don't like using those terms, but it is a matter of history.) There were also some children born due to indrecetions and in some cases marriages. These are difficult to trace as the information was often hidden from census workers and even family members.

In Volume 95, I published some of the information that I have been able to find, although there is no guarantee it is 100% acuarate. However, that is true of all ancestral research. There were two family lines published in that issue.

(1)- Hagen Smooten, born in SC, and died in TX, had one child with John Dedman. He is listed as Henry Dedmon, (March 03, 1860 -April 05, 1932) listed in the 1880 census as Race: Mulatto. His descendents are all listed as Africian-American.

(2) Another family I found is Spencer Deadman, born a slave in Kentucky in 1813. I have no idea who his parents were and if he was given the surname Deadman because that was the name of his "master" or his father (or both). I listed the descendents of both these lines in Volume 95.

I recently discovered a third line that begins with Philip Dedman, born 1835 in Alabama. I have been unable to locate his parents, although I know there were several Dedman/Dedmon families living in Alabama in 1835. Pre Civil War records are hard to locate, even if they ever existed. To the best of my ability here is the lineage of Philip.

You will notice the surname spelling goes back and forth between Dedman and Dedmon, but keep in mind this is true of all families in the Deadman lineage. In fact, I believe the spelling of Deadmon appears in Philip's line. Many of the African-American lineage uses Deadmon(d).

Mrs. Emily Dedman Bortner, 50, and her 19-month-old grandson, Gary Lee Wolfe, drowned late yesterday when their auto overturned off a dirt embankment into Red Willow creek on the Bortner farm south of St. Ann, about 15 miles northwest of McCook.

Officials were not able to determine what caused the car to leave the road and plunge about 15 feet into the creek bed, landing on its top. Mrs. Bortner had taken the boy with her to pick up their afternoon mail and was returning from the mailbox on a private road running alongside the creek. They had just crossed a rough wooden bridge over the stream before overturning.

Mrs. Bortner was born in Missouri May 4, 1896. She married James Bortner in Marshfield, Missouri on May 22, 1915 and soon after that they moved to their farm home here.
