KENTUCKY OWL



DRINK THE WISE MAN'S BOURBON EST 1879



I am not a drinker, in fact I have never tasted beer or whiskey. There have been a few times where we worshioed that fermented wine was used in the Lord's Supper. That and maybe some alcohol content in cough syrup is the only alcohol I have ever drank. I wanted it to be clear that I am not suggesting anyone go out and purchase any form of alcoholic beverage. That being said, I am publishing this story for the historical content as it involves the Dedman family and I think it is interesting.

Back in 1879, in the now forgotten community of Oregon along the Kentucky River in northern Mercer County, there stood a distillery that produced Kentucky Owl bourbon. It was founded by **C.M. Dedman**, an orphan adopted by a judge who gifted it to him as a wedding present. **Dedman** operated Kentucky Owl until 1916, when state government agents compelled by the rising tides of teetotalism swooped in and spirited away all of Dedman's stock, some 250,000 gallons in various stages of aging, hauling it by barge up the river to be warehoused under lock and key in Frankfort.

Dedman's son, T. C. Dedman Sr., spent a good part of his life seeking some sort of recompence for the purloined bourbon, but never saw a penny. In spite of that considerable loss, the family managed to survive, coming into ownership of Harrodsburg's famed Beaumont Inn, where it continues to thrive.

Cool story, right? Much of it can be documented as fact; the rest is the misty stuff of legend woven by generations of Dedmans in late-night conversations ripened by a splash or two of the good stuff.

"As my grandfather used to say, 'Never let the truth get in the way of a good story,' so we'll play it up big," says Dixon Dedman, the fifth-generation scion of Beaumont Inn, where he presides over the Old Owl Tavern and Owl's Nest Lounge.

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"My grandfather used to tell us that if he ever won the lottery, he'd do two things," Dixon Dedman says. "First, he'd buy a limousine. And then he'd start the whiskey business back up." Dedman's relatives have been spinning stories about the family distillery since 1916, when state authorities shut the original Kentucky Owl down in a fit of pre-Prohibition puritanism.

The Old Owl TAVERN is named for the Dedman family's Kentucky Owl Bourbon Whiskey distilled along the Kentucky River prior to Prohibition. This southern wing, ground floor area originally provided housing for the horse carriages transporting the young ladies to this prestigious girls' school. Dirt floors and "Kentucky marble" stone walls have been transformed into a popular casual bar and restaurant complete with porch dining cooled by ceiling fans and century old shade trees.

The original hand-hewn beams, fireplace mantel, hand-cut stone walls and splendid old photographs depicting many of Mercer County's pre-Prohibition distilleries provide a glimpse back into Harrodsburg's colorful past. The TAVERN boasts casual fare, great wine and spirits available from the Kentucky-crafted twenty-three foot mahogany bar. It merrily beckons the weary traveler, as did the early Harrodsburg taverns of the 18th and 19th century.

The fifth-generation innkeeper already had his hands full eight years ago when, at the dawn of the whiskey renaissance, a friend suggested that the time might be right to revive the distillery. But the idea stuck with him, and now the family brand is blazing its way back into liquor stores with a powerful barrel proof bourbon swaddled in velvety layers of fruit and cinnamon. Kentucky Owl's small first release is a blend of whiskeys aged in barrels charred to all five standard levels, meaning that it marries toasted oak with more aggressive notes of thoroughly blackened wood. And because it's balanced, the bourbon is easy to sip straight, without mixers or even ice. "You can't hide

anything when you bottle your whiskey at barrel proof," says Dedman, who still runs a hotel by day. "It says 'Dedman' on that label, and we have no interest in putting anything in the bottle that is not of the utmost quality."

Those familiar with the history of Beaumont Inn know my name is Samuel Dixon Dedman, the fifth generation of my family to serve as Innkeeper in this family business. (*See Volume 87 of THE DEDMON CONNECTION for more information on the Beaumont Inn.*)

What many of you do not know is that around the same time period, my great-great grand mother, Annie Bell Goddard, was purchasing these thirty-some acres and three story 1845 structure to convert it from a college for women to it's present state as a full-service country inn, my great-great grandfather Charles Mortimer Dedman and his son, Thomas Curry Dedman, Sr., were dealing with the Act of Prohibition and the subsequent closure of their distillery, Kentucky Owl.

Their distillery was located in North Mercer County, a community called Oregon, on the banks of the

Kentucky River. Started in 1879, they produced Kentucky Owl Sour Mash Bourbon Whiskey, "The Wise Man's Whiskey." In or about 1916, not only were they ordered to cease production, but their remaining stocks were put on barges, taken to Frankfort and housed in 'Government Warehouses', where they were guaranteed

safe storage and thus not allowed to purchase any type of insurance for their stocks. Shortly thereafter, they received word that these warehouses were mysteriously burned, and as you might expect, they were never able to recover the first dime for their property. Many subsequent filings were held, but to no avail.

From that period up until a few years ago, that was the end of the story of Kentucky Owl. Previous generations had often spoken of how much it would mean to them to see the brand reborn, but it was not to be. That is until a chance encounter in Austin, Texas with a fellow innkeeper, who also happens to be one of the most acclaimed winemakers in the Napa Valley Region of

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California. At dinner one night, my very good friend Mark Carter of Carter Cellars and I discussed the booming growth of the bourbon industry and how much both of us would like to venture into this world.

The stage was set. Mark made plans to visit us in Kentucky, and it was up to me to start to test the waters to see how feasible it might be to resurrect our old family brand. Needless to say this new adventure took time. But at long last, after many dead ends, several trips for Mark and his wife Sherri from the west coast, and with the help of many, many influential people in the bourbon world, we are ecstatic to announce that Kentucky Owl Kentucky Straight Bourbon Whiskey is alive once again, and we are all very, very excited about its potential!

After tireless work from Sherri Carter developing the new branding and label we are so proud of, we are currently slated to bottle our first release in mid-July 2014, hitting store shelves and a select group of fine bourbon-themed establishments in August. We couldn't be more thrilled. We have brought in some of the most talented and capable palates in the bourbon industry to help guide us on this journey. We have finally settled on a first release. This will be a blend of only 5 barrels we have hand-selected for the blending of this first release. It will only yield between 1300 and 1400 bottles, bottled at barrel proof, with hand-written numberings of batch, bottle number and proof. It was a painstaking process selecting these barrels, but just as we strive to do here at Beaumont Inn and as Mr. Carter does with his wine, until we found a superior product, we would not release the first drop.

This thinking also influenced our decision to only bottle at barrel proof. We feel that you, the consumer, should decide how you like to drink it. Our product will remain in its truest form, uncut and unfiltered, and thus, only when the bourbon presents itself in a quality we deem worthy of Kentucky Owl, will we bottle and release it. Based on the impact The Owl has had in our blind tastings with many notable bourbon enthusiasts/aficionados, we're proud to say this first batch will set the bar high. There is much more in line to follow this first release, and when the time comes, you shall have it.

Our barrel proof, uncut and unfiltered Kentucky Owl coats the entire palate with initial sweetness of caramelized sugar and dark fruit. The mid-palate sensation is of oak with a sweet cedar spice and slight citrus, while the finish is long, peppery, with a sweet dark cherry sensation. The color is deep amber and

the nose has a sweet oaky aroma with a touch of cinnamon. Bottled at close to 119 proof, Kentucky Owl has a subtle warmth—not overpowering with alcohol, but a richness only found in bourbon in its truest form.


We are delighted to announce that Kentucky Owl Kentucky Straight Bourbon Whiskey will once again be available after a long hiatus. It may not be the same bourbon my great-great grandfather produced years ago, but I feel very confident that he and the generations that followed would be very proud of the product we are about to introduce to the market

Republic National Distributors of Kentucky actually controls the future of the 1,500 bottles from Batch 1 of Kentucky Owl. "They cut us a check and they basically own it," Dixon said. Republic will determine when Kentucky Owl is released — Dixon said it might debut in August but likely no later than the fall. They also determine where it will be available and the wholesale price. Retailers will add their markup.

"I anticipate it will be priced \$150 to \$160 a bottle," Dixon said. "That's where I'd like to see it, but I think a lot will be pushed up. I hope that it's so popular people will pay any amount to get it."


While waiting to see the splash Kentucky Owl makes, Dixon will be keeping close tabs on the other barrels getting their age on, waiting for a handful of them to find the "sweet spot" and become Batch 2. It might be six months from now, a year, whenever the mystery of the stuff reveals itself. "We're never going to put anything out there we don't believe in," he said. "We're not on any sort of timetable. It will tell us when it's ready."


