BATTLESHIPS HMS CAMPERDOWN AND HMS VICTORIA COLLIDE


June 22, 1893: HMS Camperdown and HMS Victoria collide near Tripoli, Lebanon. Victoria was a Victoriaclass battleship launched on April 9, 1887. She was 340 feet long and 70 feet wide at the beam. Her displacement was 11,200 tons. Camperdown was an Admiral-class battleship launched on November 24, 2885. She was 330 feet long and 68.5 feet wide at the beam. Her displacement was 10,800 tons. Both ships were operated by the British Royal Navy. The Admiral class was preceded by the Colossus class and replaced by the Victoria class. There were six ships in the Admiral class while there were only two of the Victoria class. Trafalgar class came next.

All the ships were powered by steam engines.

The Royal Navy had a huge presence in the Mediterranean Sea during this period of time. It was a vital route for trade with India and Britain felt compelled to defend passage from against French and Italian fleets. On this day, with most of the fleet participating in annual summer exercises, there were 11 ironclads which included 8 battleships and 3 large cruisers near Tripoli. Vice-Admiral Sir George Tryon was in charge of the British Mediterranean Fleet. He was aboard the Victoria on this day. It was his belief that the best way to keep crews efficient was by continuous fleet evolutions. Since this was before the use of wireless communication, movements were signaled by flags, semaphore, and signal lamp. Tyron had earned a reputation for daring as well as being proficient at handling ships.

He was known for his use of a new system of maneuvers whereby only a few simple signals could be used for complex movement. The system needed all ship captains to use initiative, something blunted after years of peace. Tryon was known for being taciturn and used limited communication as a training method. This forced his captains to think quickly. Tryon and Victoria were at the head of one column of six ships and traveling at 8 knots. Rear-Admiral Albert Markham was in the lead ship of the second column, Camperdown. The two had broken with tradition and Markham had been apprised of Tryon's intention of anchoring the fleet in close formation. While under discussion, others under Tryon's command noted the close quarters were too close. He was not swayed.

As they practiced their maneuver, the two lead ships collided with Camperdown ramming the starboard side of the Victoria about 12 feet below the waterline and penetrating about 9 feet into the other ship.



Camperdown reversed engines, which allowed more water to pour in. Two minutes after colliding the ships were separate again. This left a 100 square foot hole in the ship. The shore was five miles distant and Tyron headed toward it. Other ships launched rescue boats. Five minutes after the collision the bow had already sunk. Eight minutes later, water was lapping the main deck. Thirteen minutes after, the ship rotated to starboard and then slipped under the water. Rescue efforts managed to save 357 crew, but 358, including Tryon, died.

Henry Charles Deadman, Assistant Engineer HMS Victoria, was one of the 358 who died in the tragic accident. The Victoria was badly holed and capsized and sank within 15 minutes with it's engines still running and propellers turning. The wreck was discovered in 2004 and was found to be standing vertically with its bow buried 30 meters into the sea bed and the stern towards the surface. --Submitted by Jim Dedman, III

SUNK OF RIP RAPS

Tug Maggie J. Jory Went Down in Six Fathoms of Water

The Fireman Turner Jones Drowned Body supposed to be Belows Decks-Tug Volunteer Rescues all others on the Tug

The Courtland Lumber Company's tug Maggie J. Jory sank yesterday about 3:00 a.m. in Hampton Roads, abreast of the Rip Raps and between the Rip Raps and Willoughby Spit.

Turner Jones, the fireman, was drowned. The tug Volunteer, of Baltimore, rescued Captain T.R. Deadman, of the Jory, and the crew-- Albert Munden, chief engineer; Ike B. Forbes, mate; William Barrom, fireman, and George Davis (colored) cook - and brought them to Norfolk.

SUNK SIX FATHOMS

The Jory is sunk in six fathoms (thirty-six feet) of water. Turners body is supposed to be below decks, as he was asleep in his bunk at the time of the sinking. He was 18 years of age, unmarried and from Raleigh, N.C. He entered on the work of a fireman on October 25th, 1899, on this tug. It is stated that Captain Deadman of the Jory, and Captain Robert Deadman of Lamberts Point, are cousins of the deceased.

HOW IT OCCURED

The Jory, it is stated, was at the time of the accident, put across the tow line of the tug Volunteer, which was passing with some barges. It is supposed that the accident was caused by reason of fact that the Jory has straight steering gear, and that the mate, in the excitement of the moment, mistook it for a cross steering gear.

SNOW PLOW INVENTION

There are two patented snow plows manufactured in this city, each the invention of an Alpena citizen. One is the well known Dewey snow plow. The other is the invention of William Deadman, which is said to be a good plow. The snow plow is used mainly at the lumber camps for clearing the log roads of unnecessary snow. it is a necessary part of a log camp outfit. The log roads are cleared of most of the snow and then water is sprinkled on what snow has been left. This forms a bed of ice for the sleighs to be drawn over, and makes the very best of a sleigh road. After such a road has been made, it is kept in good condition by a water sprinkler. If a new lot of snow falls on such a road it has to be removed, and these snow plows are the best and cheapest means for throwing the snow out of the log road.

Until this winter all such plows were purchased of outside parties, but now it is not necessary for an Alpena lumberman to import such implements, they can buy as good snow plows, if not better, of Alpena manufacturers than they can get anywhere. In fact the superiority of the Alpena plow over those made elsewhere, is so apparent that many of the plows have been sold to lumberman in other parts of the State. Mr. Deadman has sold fourteen of his plows to outside parties, and Mr. Dewey shipped nine of his to various sections of the country. We are glad to see these industries springing up in our city. It benefits every citizen as it tends to create work here, and brings wealth to our city.

BEAUTIFUL AND PRACTICAL GENEALOGY CHARTS NOW AVAILABLE


