He died August 20, 2002, in Dallas, Texas at the age of 76.

James Dedman Stabbed To Death By Louis Hagen

A few minutes after midnight this morning James Dedman was stabbed to death by Louis Hagen at George Waldeman's Saloon, two and three fourth miles back of Covington, Ky., on the Independence Pike. The two men had been engaged for some time in an exciting game of cards, which finally terminated in a misunderstanding and a war of words.

Dedman, it is alleged, put his hand behind him in a threatening manner, remarking, "I'll fix him"; whereupon Hagen drew a knife and stabbed his antagonist twice. Dedman fell heavily and expired in a few moments, before surgical assistance arrived.

The real trouble seems to be, according to Hagen's story, that Dedman, Hagen and Ed Wolf were engaged in a social game of euchre, when Dedman accused Hagen of not discarding properly. Hagen claimed that he did, when Dedman called him "a lying son of a ___." and at the same time jumped from his chair and said "I'll fix you", and started towards him with his hand on his hip pocket. He advanced on young Hagen, who warned him to keep his distance.

But Dedman did not seem to pay any attention to young Hagen, for he advanced to within reaching distance with his hand still in a threatening attitude, when Hagen pulled his knife and stabbed him three times - once in the arm, once on the left of the sternum below the shoulder blade, and once on the right of the neck above the shoulder blade, the last stroke proving fatal. He died in four and a quarter minutes.

Coroner DeGruyder, of Kenton County, Ky., held an inquest at 5 o'clock this morning, and the jury returned a verdict of "death from a knife in the hands of Louis Hagen." Immediately after the killing young Hagen came to Covington and procured the services of Dr. J. J. Dulaney, and hastened back only to find his victim dead. He then immediately returned to Covington and gave himself up to Frank Meyers, the night Turnkey of the Covington Jail. The Criminal Court docket of Kenton County shows where he has been indicted and convicted of several misdemeanors and criminal offenses.

At the Coroner's investigation to-day Mrs. Waldeman testified that when Hagen struck Dedman he (Dedman) was not approaching Hagen. Public opinion sides with the prisoner that he committed the deed in self defense. He was arraigned in the Covington Police Court to-day, and at his own request his examination was postponed until Wednesday morning.

Hagen is a one armed man about twenty-three years of age, and is a half brother of Mr. John Bosshammer, a barber of this city. Dedman was about twenty-seven years of age, a farmer by occupation, and was conceded to be a hard case.

Hiking trails circle the rim as well as lead down into the mouth of the volcano.

Bruce Dedman Hurls Second No-Hitter As Blue Devils Blank Brockport, 4-0

Walton and Fricano both rapped bases-loaded homers in a nine-run fifth inning, giving Dedman a big boost in his no-hit performance against Eastridge. Dedman fanned ten, walked two and hit a batter in the 11-0 win.

Bruce Dedman, whose varsity pitching career began less than two weeks ago, hurled his second no-hitter in a row Thursday as the Batavia High School Blue Devils thumped Brockport 4-0 in a Monroe County Western Division game at MacArthur Stadium.

Dedman, a Junior, moved from shortstop to the mound 11 days ago when he blanked Hilton on one hit, 10-0, has given up just one hit and no runs in his 27 innings on the mound this season. His first no-hitter came just a week ago as Batavia crushed Eastridge, 11-0.

The Blue Devils scored all four runs in the third inning as Wayne Benedict drove home two runs and Steve Smith and Dennis Buckley each came up with doubles. Dedman struck out seven batters as the Blue Devils won their 13th game in 20 decisions this year. The line score:

Respected Mayor Bob Dedman dies at 85

Lifelong Lebanon resident and former Wilson County Mayor Robert Dedman died Thursday at home. He was 85. Dedman served as Wilson County mayor for 12 years, from 1998 until he retired and current Mayor Randall Hutto became mayor in 2012. Before he was sworn in as mayor, Dedman served on the Lebanon City Council and as property assessor for three terms. Dedman's accomplishments are many, and those in the community remember him fondly.

"When I think of Bob Dedman, I think of a true champion and leader, whether it be in sports, politics or in life. He was always someone who listened to the people and wasn't afraid to stand up for what was right. My thoughts and prayers are with his family," former Wilson County Property Assessor Jack Pratt said.

Before Dedman was a politician, he was an athlete. He played on several championship football teams, including for Paul "Bear" Bryant at the University of Kentucky. When Dedman played for Lebanon High School from 1951-53, the Blue Devils football team was undefeated. Statton Bone, who met Dedman at Lebanon High School in 1952, said he always made time for everyone. Dedman graduated from Lebanon in 1953. "He did many, many good things for Lebanon and Wilson County over the years. He served in several different areas. He was very supportive of the Nashville Superspeedway back in its day and the development along I-840. He was a good public servant," Bone said.

"Mayor Dedman was a great statesman in my mind in that he never lost an election. He really ran the county with ease. He got things done, not only as property assessor but also as county mayor for 12 years. He was a great man and a great mentor for me when I first thought about becoming a mayor," said Hutto. Dedman began his political career in 1972. He served as Lebanon's first purchasing agent, worked for the secretary of state in 1978 and was then elected to the Lebanon City Council. During his time on the council, Pratt said he was influential to bring ward districts to Lebanon. He served as Senate sergeant-at-arms for the 100th Tennessee General Assembly. "Bob was a great man. He was awfully good to me. I served as ag director when he was the county mayor. He was a good guy, a good leader. The county lost a good man. My sympathy goes out to his family," Larry Tomlinson said.

Robert was the only child of Dewey Frances Dedman and Maggie Marie Graves Dedman, born November 4, 1933. He was a life-long resident, born and raised in Lebanon, Wilson County, Tennessee, being away only during his tour of duty in the U.S. Army in the Korean Conflict. Robert attended grade school at Highland Heights School, graduated from Lebanon High School, Class of 1953, and attended the University of Kentucky. Robert won many District/Regional Honors in basketball and football. He played on the 1951 – 1953 LHS Blue Devils Football team that held the honor of the longest undefeated streak in Tennessee, 27 consecutive games. In 1952, Robert was the first LHS Football player in history to win statewide recognition, selected as All Associated Press, All State Team, outstanding on both offense and defense. At the University of Kentucky, Robert played football under Paul "Bear" Bryant. In 1953, out of 37 Grid football players, he was the only non-Kentuckian for a scholarship.

Robert was honored for his public service in 1998-1999 with the Lebanon High School Distinguished Service Award. He was one of the first to be inducted in the Lebanon High School Sports Hall of Fame in 2007. In 2009, Robert was awarded as a Life Time Member of the Lebanon/Wilson County Chamber of Commerce. Robert is survived by his wife of 59 years, Faye Tribble Dedman, daughters Robbie Dedman Farmer and Karen Dedman, granddaughters Lacey (Mike) Acuff and Lindsay (Micah) Williams, great-grandsons Nolan and Adam Acuff and Cayden and Brody Williams, and special family member Jeanette Muirhead. He is preceded in death by his parents Dewey Frances and Maggie Marie Graves Dedman. The family extends their deepest gratitude to Robert's caregivers, Jeffrey Napier and Amber Thomas, and the hospice team.
