WHAT IS A COUSIN?

Ever find yourself asking "So what exactly is a second cousin?" or debating with your family and friends about what it means to be a "first cousin once removed"? Use our cousin chart to settle the debate once and for all! Cousins are people who share a common ancestor that is at least 2 generations away, such as a grandparent or great-grandparent. You and your siblings are not cousins because your parents are only 1 generation away from you.

Simple enough, right? But what does it mean to have a second or third or fourth cousin? The number associated with your cousin has to do with how many generations away your common ancestor is. For example: First cousins share a grandparent (2 generations)... Second cousins share a great-grandparent (3 generations) Third cousins share a great-great-grandparent(4 generations). Fourth cousins share a 3rd-great grandparent (5 generations).

Quick Tip: Count how many "greats" are in your common ancestor's title and add 1 to find out what number cousin your relative is. Note that grandparents have no "greats" in their titles, so cousins who share grandparents are first cousins because 0 + 1 = 1. However, keep in mind that this trick only works if you are both the same number of generations removed from the common ancestor.

Sometimes you and your cousin may share a common ancestor, but you each call this ancestor something different. For example, the common ancestor may be your great-grandparent, but your cousin's great-great grandparent. This is where the phrase "once removed" comes in handy. To be "once removed" from a cousin means you are separated by one generation. The number before "removed" will always represent the number of generations you are separated ("removed") from the cousin.

Your parent's first, second, and third cousins are also your first, second, and third cousins—but once removed. This is because your parents and their generation are 1 above yours. Likewise, your grandparents' first, second, and third cousins are also your first, second, and third cousins, this time twice removed. This pattern continues throughout each generation. So, for example, a first cousin once removed is either the child of your first cousin or the parent of your second cousin. Now that you know what to call your distant cousins, use the chart above to calculate your cousinship! --FamilySearch.org



JESSE DEADMAN - 1806 - 1863

Jesse Deadman was born in 1806 (Jan.19,1810??), in Rowan, North Carolina, his father, James Thomas DEADMAN, was 46 and his mother, Elizabeth "Eliza" Tadlock, was 34 when he was born. He married Anna C Daniel on 16 March 1829, in Rowan, North Carolina. Jesse and Anna were the parents of 4 sons, William, James, Daniel and John. Also 4 daughters, Sarah, Mary Ann, Lucy and Rebecca. All the children were born in N.C. Jesse died on March 2, 1863, in Davie, North Carolina, at the young age of 57.

During Jesse Deadman's lifetime he witnessed many changes as America was being established, He lived in a time where changes were being made in order to make this country what it is today. One can only imagine what the future changes will be to make America even better than it is now. In Jesse Deadman's lifetime however, he had witnessed more than most ever would.

1808 (Age 2)

Atlantic slave trade was abolished.

On the first day of January 1808, Federal law made it illegal to import captive people from Africa into the United States. This date marks the end, the permanent, legal closure of the Atlantic slave trade into our country.

1812 (Age 6)

The War of 1812... Jun 18, 1812 – Feb 18, 1815 The United States declares war on Britain over British interference with American maritime shipping and westward expansion.

1813-1814 (Age 7)

Cree War-United States vs. Cree Nation

1825 · The Crimes Act (Age 19)

The Crimes Act was made to provide a clearer punishment of certain crimes against the United States. Part of it includes: Changing the maximum sentence of imprisonment to be increased from seven to ten years and changing the maximum fine from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

1830-1838 · Trail of Tears (Age 24 - 32)

In the 1838, President Jackson called for all the Native Americans to be forced off their own land. As the Cherokee were forced out of North Carolina many of them hid in the mountains of North Carolina. Many other Cherokee people were forcibly moved from their homeland and relocated to Indian Territory, now Oklahoma. They resisted their removal by creating their own newspaper, The Cherokee Phoenix, as a platform for their views. They sent their educated young men on speaking tours throughout the United States. They lobbied Congress, and created a petition with more than 15,000 Cherokee signatures against removal. They took their case to the U.S. Supreme Court, which ruled that they were a sovereign nation in Worcester vs. Georgia (1832). President Andrew Jackson ignored the Supreme Court decision, enforced his Indian Removal Act of 1830, and pushed through the Treaty of New Echota. In 1838 Cherokee people were forcibly taken from their homes, incarcerated in stockades, forced to walk more than a thousand miles, and removed to Indian Territory, Oklahoma. More than 4,000 died and many are buried in unmarked graves along "The Trail Where They Cried."

1836 (Age 30)

War of Texas Independence Texas vs. Mexico

1846 (Age 40)

The Mexican - American War. The United States acquires large tracts of Mexican territory in wake of Mexican War including California and New Mexico. This war lasted for 2 years.

1853 · (Age 47)

The first state fair in North Carolina was held in Raleigh and was put on by the North Carolina State Agricultural Society in 1853. The fair has been continuous except for during the American Civil War and Reconstruction and WWII. As of 2022 The State Fair is a yearly occasion

1861 (Age 55)

The American Civil War

1862, (Age 56)

On September 22, President Abraham Lincoln issues an Emancipation Proclamation, which sets a date for the freedom of more than 3 million enslaved in the United States and recasts the Civil War as a fight against slavery.

1863 (Age57)

On January 1, 1863, Lincoln issued the final Emancipation Proclamation, which declared "that all persons held as slaves are, and henceforward shall be free." Jesse Deadman passed away March 2,1863, just days after President Lincolns famous speech.

It would be Jesse's son Daniel Martin Dedman who changed the spelling of his last name after leaving N.C. and arriving in Sweet Springs, MO..

As a 45-year Genealogist I have found many documents, certificates and articles. I have been to many places throughout the United States. As I sit here looking upon your headstones, I can only wonder what it was like when you were alive. Did you have a hard life, were you happy? When you died, family and friends dressed in dark colored clothing gathered to say "Good bye". Flowers of many colors with ribbons attached are set upon the graves. Were hearts grieving as prayers are said and songs are sung? Were the ladies' hankies wet with water as the tears fell from the cheeks? Did many hats tilt for you as the men walked away?

Days and perhaps weeks go by and they come back again to say "Hello" for a few moments only to say "Good -bye" again. Then your visitor goes home. As time passes the visits get fewer and fewer, to become no visits at all. You may think you have been left behind as generations pass you by. Weather and time are putting marks upon your headstones. Some of you are breaking, some have fallen to the ground from where they once stood. Some are leaning, some have sunk into the ground. Though they are dirty and covered with moss, some are still standing tall. You thought you were forgotten, but you weren't. Even after so many generations, your names are written down in families bibles, your children's names too. Even your grandchildren can be found in many books. You are written about in family journals too. I wish I could read some of those, to read about the way you lived back then and how you worked. How you played, what school was like. What your Sundays were like. I have no old journals, so all I can do is look at these headstones and let my imagination take me to the 1700's and 1800's .

I want you to know you are also included in many family trees including my own. All of your descendants are far too many to count. Many are piecing together "your story", in a way that it makes you all come to life again. So, you see, you are not forgotten. Your stories are cherished. As I sit here looking at all these headstones, many you can't read at all anymore. What happens with those you can't read? I wonder how future generations will find you? I hope they find you just like I did. I know others will come looking, I won't be the last. Yes, I came looking for you.

You don't know me, but I know you. I'm your 8x's Granddaughter. And I'm your 7x's Granddaughter. And I'm your 6x's Granddaughter. And 6x-7x-8xGrandniece to all of you. The rest of you, you are my cousins. I have to go now, but I will be back to visit you again.

You may be asking yourself "Why was she so "Aww struck". People find cemeteries every day, right? This is very true. Researchers with a few dollars to spend do travel to find cemeteries every day. Let me tell you a little bit of my own story now if I may.

I was born in Montana and became interested in Genealogy when I was about 19 years old and did not have a few dollars to spare.

My husband was in the military so I have lived in a few places. Let's face it, unless you've been associated with the military you don't usually leave the place your born in. Call if fate, call it what you will. Was it meant to be? Was I supposed to find the cemetery? Was I supposed to come full circle? I am now living in the state where several "different lines" of my family migrated to back in the late 1600's! Abbotts Creek Cemetery is in High Point N.C. less than 2 hours from where I live. Only back then it was called "Browntown". To me, it was fate, I have come "Full Circle". I was meant to be here.

WILL ESTABLISH PLANT **TO MAKE STOCK FOOD** Mr. Dedman here for That Purpose

Mr. J.D. Dedman, a former Missourian, but for several years a resident of North Alabama, is in Americus for the purpose of establishing here a plant for the manufacture of stock feed. Mr. Dedman had preciously looked over the situation here, and is so pleased that he is now ready to establish his enterprise.

Mr. Dedman will have the co-operation of several local business men in the manufacture of the product proposed. A factory site, near the seaboard depot, has been secured and a building will be erected there as soon as it can be done. The plant will have a capacity of about twenty tons daily. The principle ingredients of the manufacture being corn, oats and alfalfa making a staple article which is sold here in large quantities. Mr. Dedman has recently purchased a farm of 125 acres near Americus, upon which he will grow a portion of the grain to be used.

The plant will employ considerable labor and will prove a valued addition to the many making up Americus' rapidly growing industrial list.
