


MAKING, MUSIG WITH THE FAMILY

MALCOLM DEDMAN



Malcolm Dedman is a musician, in particular, a composer of new 'concert' music. Born in November 1948 in London, he came to music via piano lessons from the age of five, given by his mother. He later had formal violin and singing lessons, but it was composition, arising out of improvising at the piano, that he was most interested in pursuing.

Initially, Malcolm taught himself the art of composition, learning from playing and listening to new music. His first formal lessons in composition were with Patric Standford at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in 1973-74. Much later, however, he pursued a Masters Degree in Composing Concert Music at Thames Valley University (now the University of West London), qualifying with distinction in 2005.

He considers his compositional style to be an individual one, benefiting from an in-depth understanding of some major twentieth century trends, ranging from serialism to quasi-aleatoric techniques. Realising that music needs to be enjoyed and understood by his audience, he now adopts an individual 'post-modern' idiom, based on original modes, that is very personal in approach. Although his music owes much to the music of Olivier Messiaen and Béla Bartók, it also integrates music by some composers of the 'post-modern' idiom as well as music from different cultures. He believes in writing music that speaks directly to the audience, conveying a purposeful message, in a style that is appropriate to this century and without compromising musical quality.

He is now living in South Africa in a quiet rural town, where he has been since September 2007. Although semi-retired, he is still teaching music and has used the opportunity to revise old scores and write much new music, some of which have received performances in various countries, including England, Ireland, France, Germany, Italy, Bulgaria, Macedonia, Slovakia, USA, Brazil, Mexico, Japan, South Korea, New Zealand and South Africa. Many of these performances have been received well by audiences and critics, including two excellent reviews by Anthony Payne given when he was living in the UK.

He has also gained several composition awards; and most of his music is self-published, along with two CDs, under the name Misty Mountain Music SA. He has signed contracts with Gusthold Music Publisher with a piece for string orchestra called Danses Concertantes and a Concerto for Piano Duet and Orchestra. A chamber orchestra piece called Comforting the Soul will be published later in 2021.

Major first performances that have been received well by both audiences and critics include: Christmas Cantata- 'The Word was Made Flesh' in 1975; Three Dance Episodes for oboe, guitar and piano at the Wigmore Hall in 1977; String Quartet no.1 at the Purcell Room in 1980; Piano Sonata No. 2 – 'In Search' at the Purcell Room in 1986, More recent first performances are listed under 'Events'.

NICOLA DEDMON

Nicola Bertoni Dedmon has been a full-time faculty member in the Fullerton College Music Department since 2015 and currently serves as Coordinator of Choral Studies, where she oversees a robust program of four different choral ensembles and conducts the Concert Choir and



Chamber Singers. She has also taught Applied Voice lessons, Music Theory, and Music Appreciation. She has also served as Music Director for numerous mainstage Musical Theater productions within Fullerton College's Theatre Department. She has also served on several different campus-wide committees and is passionate about the deep sense of community at Fullerton College.

Professor Dedmon grew up in Washington, D.C., where she began studying classical music from a young age. She eventually went on to pursue a Bachelor of Music degree in vocal performance at James Madison University in Harrisonburg, VA, where she first discovered her passion for choral music and conducting. After JMU, she began her graduate coursework at Westminster Choir College in Princeton, NJ, where she earned her Master of Music degree in choral conducting under the tutelage of Dr. Joe Miller and Dr. Amanda Ouist. While at Westminster, Professor Dedmon served as the graduate conducting assistant of the Westminster Chapel Choir. Also during her time at Westminster, she sang in the internationally-renown Westminster Choir, the Westminster Symphonic Choir, and Kantorei. Through her participation in these ensembles, she performed frequently with the Philadelphia Orchestra and the New York Philharmonic under the batons of Yannick Nezet-Seguin, Alan Gilbert, Daniele Gati, Vladimir Yurowski, among others. She also spent two summers as a member of the choir-in-residence at the Spoleto Festival USA in Charleston, South Carolina. Most importantly, a winter Westminster Choir tour down the coast of California caused her to fall in love with the West Coast, and more specifically, Southern California. She now happily resides in North Tustin with her husband, Nicholas Dedmon, and she is thrilled to call Fullerton College her home.



FLOSSIE MCLAIN DEDMOND

One of the 2 residence halls on campus of Coppin State University in Baltimore, MD is a 88,000 square foot facility that includes modern living and learning facilities named the, Flossie Dedmond Residence Hall. The college's president, Calvin W. Burnett gave this tribute on her behalf... "She was without a doubt one of the most dedicated and staunch supporters Coppin has ever known." The Rev. Harold A. Carter, pastor of New Shiloh Baptist Church in West Baltimore, where she was a member, described Mrs. Dedmond as "a genuine Sojourner Truth in matters related to the advancement of Afro-Americans and all people in general. She drew strength from a deep spirituality and faith in God. She was a doer and made things happen."




Dr. Dedmond received a BA degree in English from Fisk University; MA degree in Speech Arts from Columbia University, and pursued post-graduate studies in English and in Speech at Ohio State University and at the Catholic University of America, respectively.

She held the degree of Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters from Allen University. At Coppin State University, she was a classroom teacher, a collaborator of Project Mission, acting chairman of the English Department, Director of the Evening University and of the Summer School, and finally, Dean of the Division of Arts and Sciences. she was a poet, writer and for more than three decades an English professor and revered administrator at Coppin State College.

Before taking her first post at Coppin, Mrs. Dedmond served in teaching and administrative positions at Allen; Benedict College in Columbia, S.C.; Knoxville College in Tennessee; and Morgan State University.

In 1947, she was hired to teach English at Coppin. She later became head of the English Department and chaired numerous committees on curriculum, salary and promotional issues, counseling and accreditation. She later became director of the Summer/Evening College and retired as dean of the Arts and Sciences Division.



"The college, and the country for that matter, will not soon see an educator and educational leader whose skills and dedication compare with those of Dr. Dedmond," Mr. Burnett said.

In 1993, the school named its first residence hall The Flossie M. Dedmond Center for Living and Learning. Before her death, she established an endowment to support the needs of students who live there.

Mrs. Dedmond's poetry, book reviews, critical essays and radio scripts have been published in literary magazines. She was the author of a Guide to Public Relations, used by the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, of which she was a member for more than 50 years.

Among her many service positions, she was a member of the governor's Appellate Judicial Nominating Commission for more than six years. She was also a former national vice president of the National Council for Negro Women, and a life member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

In 1970, Mrs. Dedmond was named one of the Outstanding Educators of America. She was inducted into the Baltimore City Commission for Women's Hall of Fame this year.

In recognition of her long service, Mrs. Dedmond was named dean emeritus when she retired in 1978.

At her passing, memorial services were held at New Shiloh, 2100 Monroe St. and at noon Oct. 2 at Coppin State College, 2500 W. North Ave.

Mrs. Dedmond's husband, Frederick H. Dedmond, a longtime head of the Foreign Language Department at Morgan State University, died in 1981.

She is survived by a sister, Alice M. Newkirk of Mount Vernon, N.Y.
