
She was not exactly a new girl at school, as I had known her in elementary school from about the second grade (when she was in the first). She and her sister were friends with my sisters. However, for the past couple of years she had been in a private school in Chattanooga, known then as Chattanooga Bible School. It is now Boyd-Buchanan Christian School. Up until about that time, I never really paid attention to individuals with long hair. (In those days anyone with long hair was without a doubt a girl. How times have changed!!!) Actually, I was the shy, bashful type and preferred sports as my activity for leisure time. Anyway, this began a relationship that has continued 'till this day.

On April 5, 1959 Jane and I were married at the Chattanooga Valley Church of Christ in Flintstone, GA on a Sunday afternoon. That was forty-five years ago... Someone asked recently, "have you ever thought about divorce?" My answer was, "no, but Jane may have thought about murder a few times". When we said, "until death do us part", I wonder if she thought I would live this long? I will be the first to admit that to make a marriage work you have to work at it. Two people living together are going to have disagreements. Marriage is give and take. Someone said, "that means if he don't give it, just take it".... Which brings me to one of the things that works against a successful marriage... and that is selfishness. We are all born a little selfish and for a while, nothing is done to change that. Nobody gets their way or is paid more attention that a new born baby. We do all we can to please them and make them happy. They learn how to get our attention and get their way early in life. The problem is that many never grow out of that.

Marriage is not the only relationship where selfishness is a problem. In fact this is true of most relationships. The work place, school, church, and friendships in general are all affected by it. As a minister, I tried to live by the principle, "you can have your say, but you may not always get your way".... That seems to work fairly well. In the home that becomes very important as even the children need to be able to have their say. Expression is a very important part of a healthy, well balanced person. Communication is listed as the number one problem in the family. How many times have I heard, "He/she, just won't talk to me"...

The text books teach that it takes about seven years for a couple to make all the necessary adjustments for a successful marriage. It is true that enough adjustment may be made during that time to help the relationship but don't think that all adjustment is over. Marriage is filled with adjustments. The very fact that you are now sharing (time, space, money, etc.) requires adjustment. In many cases children come to the relationship. Adjustment begins and does not stop for at least 25 years. Think about it.

First there is the physical care of the infant. Feeding, changing, nurturing, health concerns, and more. I don't know about you, but we didn't have much experience at being parents. Getting up in the middle of the night to prepare a bottle of milk or change a diaper was new to me. It made sense to take turns, but I was just not thinking when Jane said, "you take the first five years"! They start to school, then it is school and sports activities. You begin to feel like a taxi driver.. You even thank the day they get their drivers license. After that the dating game, then marriage, then grandchildren, then retirement, then.... then... does it ever stop...

### **Claire Lyons Dedmon**

(avid researcher of city history)

Claire Lyons Dedmon was born in a small farm town in western Illinois, but lived most of her life in Chicago and adopted the city as her own. She worked with a variety of civic groups, including the Chicago Historical Society, and helped her husband, former Chicago Sun-Times editor Emmett Dedmon, research his popular 1953 history of the city, *Fabulous Chicago*.

Mr. Dedmon, who died in 1983, was so impressed with her efforts that he dedicated the book to her, calling her "My Fabulous Chicagoan." "He was listed as the author, but she helped a lot," said the couple's son, Jonathan Dedmon. "She had a great affinity for Chicago's history."

Mrs. Dedmon died Thursday at her Chicago home after battling cancer and Parkinson's disease. She was 84. Visitation will be from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. today at Lake View Funeral Home, 1458 W. Belmont. A memorial service will be held at 3 p.m. today at First Saint Paul's Lutheran Church, 1301 N. La Salle. Burial will be at Graceland Cemetery

Mrs. Dedmon was born in 1919 in Geneseo, but moved to Chicago as a young child. She graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Northwestern University. She met her future husband when both worked at the former Chicago Times in the late 1930s. "She was the editor's secretary; my dad was a reporter," Jonathan Dedmon said.

Mrs. Dedmon was separated from her husbandto-be during World War II when he spent two years in a German prisoner-of-war camp. They were married when he returned to Chicago after the war.

Mrs. Dedmon was involved with a number of civic organizations for much of her life, including serving as president of the Hull House Association and the Guild of the Chicago Historical Society. She was a member of the women's boards of the Field Museum, the University of Chicago and Northwestern University. While her husband spent his career as a newspaperman, Mrs. Dedmon generally steered clear of the business, with one notable exception. She entered the Sun-Times' contest to pick a new writer for the Ann Landers advice column in 1955, but a woman named Eppie Lederer was selected instead.

That might have worked out for the best because Mrs. Dedmon's husband was an editor at the paper at the time. "She entered, but it would have been very difficult with my dad working at the paper," Jonathan Dedmon said.

Survivors also include six nieces. Her husband died in 1983. A memorial service will be held at 3 p.m. Tuesday at First Saint Paul's Lutheran Church, 1301 N. La Salle.

Visitation will be from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Tuesday at the Lake View Funeral Home, 1458 W. Belmont, followed by burial at Graceland Cemetery.

(Emmett Dedmon was the son of Roy E. Deadman and Cora Frank and the grand son of Elijah Corbin Deadman, III and Alice Elizabeth O'Neal. He is another of several who show up as changing their spelling to DEDMON. My brother, Tom, recently bought one of his books off E-Bay. William Lane Dedman's widow, Mary, filed for a widow's pension, application #W14610. William served in MASS Line in the Colonel's Company of Col. Nixon's regiment. He married Mary GREEN 13 March 1783 in South Reading MA per the Middlesex County Clerk of Court. They resided in Stoneham, Middlesex County, MA. William "occasionally went to sea" and died in Charleston, SC in 1789 or 1790. Also had brothers named John L. Dedman & Samuel Dedman

### **CAVENDER FAMILY PHOTO**

This was a photo taken in Villanow, GA. in 1933 at the old Cavender Home place. All four of Joseph Warren Cavenders daughters who survived childhood are present and also the wife of his son Judson Cicero Cavender.

Standing on the back row on the porch on the far left with pipe in mouth is Melville Warrenfells, who was the son of Minnie Cavender. Man on other side of column is unidentified (but a guess would be Melville's father, J. M. Warrenfells. The next adult with face in shadow is Robert (Bob) Collins Cavender, the youngest child of Judson Cicero and Flora Collins Cavender. The young boy in front of Bob Cavender is unidentified. Note that he is holding a violin and Bob has his arm aroung him. He might be a son of Maxwell Shahan who is the next man pictured who is holding a baby. The gentleman on the far right standing on porch is Joseph (Joe) Judson Cavender, the middle son of Judson and Flora. The lady who is seen in profile between Maxwell and Joe and who is leaning against the column is Flora Collins Cavender — wife of Judson Cicero Cavender.

The lady standing on the far left in front of column is Clementine Cavender Magill, the next lady is Minnie Cavender Warrenfells, next lady unidentified, next lady is Myrtis Cavender Shahan, the next lady seated on the top step is Rhoda Beck Castleberry, and she is to the left of the next standing lady Georgia Cavender Beck, the standing gentleman to the right of Georgia might be her husband B. W. Beck (but this is a guess).



The lady on the far left seated on the front row is Lillian Magill Barnett, next to Lillian is a gentleman with a child on either side, (a guess is that the children are Lillian's and he is her father, C. H. Magill. The seated lady on the first row directly in front of Mytis is also unidentified. The identifications of those pictured was made by Eddie Hightower, son of Martha Eleanor Cavender Hightower, and Richard Llewellyn (Lew) Chapman, Jr.

I hope that those of you who can help with additional identifications will please do so. Thanks, -- Eddie Hightower
