February 1, 19xx was a “red letter day” for Berlin and Cynthia Glasscock as their first child was born. Jane was the oldest of three children, Ruth and Edward LeBron. On April 5, 1959 she became my bride (a red letter day for me). We are approaching our 46th anniversary. (In fact it has already taken place.) She is the mother of our precious children, Gary and Gwen. We are greatly blessed with three grandchildren: Carrie, Greg and Jonathan and two great grandchildren: Masie and Curt. Those who know us best recognize the organizer and stability of the relationship. She has been my inspiration and encourager for the 45 plus years of preaching the Gospel. She knows how to be a “preacher’s wife”.. She did not marry a preacher as I was a design draftsman with Combustion Engineering in Chattanooga when we married. However, when I decided make the “career change” she was in agreement. I could not have done it without her. For six months we are the same age... then I become older again. I took her out to Provinos for supper on her birthday... No expenses spared... I am a big spender... .. Oh, ok so you know they give a free meal on your birthday... It’s the thought that counts...



It seems like only yesterday when brother McBroom called me and asked if I could preach at Gurley, AL until they could find a preacher!!!

Keep in mind that until that time I had only “filled in” for preachers in the North Alabama area. I was not really a preacher. In fact I sometimes wonder what it takes to be one. I remember several years ago, while at Springfield, TN, I was “arrested” for impersonating a preacher. That’s another story for another day.... Back to this story.....

It began while I was still in High School shortly after I was baptized at the Chattanooga Valley Church of Christ in Flintstone, GA. James Watkins, the preacher that baptized me, had moved to the East Chattanooga congregation, and Lawrence Garmon came to the Valley to be our preacher. Those who remember brother Garmon know that he was strong on preacher training. In the short time he was at the Valley, he had almost every male member of the congregation in the pulpit at one time or another. He instilled into the hearts of the Valley members the importance of preacher training. The last time we counted there was at least a dozen men who are now preaching the Gospel. In fact the current preacher at the Valley, Ried Perry, is “home grown”....

Only eternity will reveal the influence of that man of God, who so unselfishly shared the pulpit with others. I can name several others who preach as a result of his influence from the other places he lived.

In the spring of 1957, it came my “turn” and to say I was nervous is putting it mildly. I remember the title of the sermon, “What Lack I Yet?”. It was from a little tract written by Gynnth Ford, entitled, “Don’t Die On Third”. Since I was an avid baseball fan, I thought that would be a subject I could handle. It was on a Sunday night, I entered the pulpit with a stack of notes six inches high. At least two hours worth of material. It might be my one and only time, I would make the most of it... Two hours was not much for such excellence...I barely stretched it into five minutes. I told this story while preaching in a Gospel Meeting a few years back and was approached by a young man who said smiling, “several of us are

wondering if you will preach that sermon again?” “Which sermon”, I asked. He replied, “That five minute sermon”. “Man”, I thought. “I can’t say hi, how are you in five minutes”. How time does change things....

Jane and I married on April 5, 1959, and moved to Huntsville, Alabama in June of the same year. I was well on my way to a great career in the NASA Space Program. Little did I know what the future held for me..... I latter thought, sending a man to heaven has to be more important that sending a man to the moon.


We began the search for a congregation in the Huntsville area to call home. That is not an easy task. One day I ran into Arlen Moore, who had also moved from Chattanooga to work at Redstone Arsenal. He and his wife, Faye, were living in Paint Rock, just east of Huntsville. He invited us to their house on Sunday for dinner and to worship with them at the little congregation in Paint Rock. We were welcomed with open arms and soon placed membership there. We then moved to a little house between Paint Rock and Gurley, Alabama.

We didn’t have preaching on Sunday night and so the men took turns presenting lessons. Since I had the “five minute” sermon available, I volunteered to take my turn. I must have done a little better and they asked me if I would be the “Sunday night preacher”. I agreed and thus actually began my career as a “gospel preacher”. That was about August of 1959.

Word got out somehow and I began getting calls from other congregations in the North Alabama area to “fill in” when their regular preacher was away. Jane recalls the knock on the door and opening it to Jimmy Elkins from the Glovers Chapel congregation. He said, “I understand a “Church of Christ preacher lives here”. She replied, “We are members of the Churh of Christ and my husband does preach some”. ”We need someone to help us Sunday” he said, and continued, “We need him to preach, lead singing and preside at the Lord’s Table.” She asked, would you settle for two out of three?” Leading singing has never been a quality of mine. I tried it once and abut half-way down the page I saw the word REFRAIN... so I stopped... everyone else kept singing...

So, in February 1960, I began preaching at Gurley, AL until they could find a preacher” That took about four years.....

HENRY Dedmon (1859-1932) was born in Texas on March 3, 1859 and died in 1932. His funeral was held in Muskogee, Oklahoma, at Peoples Funeral Home. He was freed by the Presidential Emancipation Proclamation Grimes County, Texas, Confederate State. He married CARRIE SMART Dedmon on December 24, 1881 in Grimes County, Texas (Galveston). Henry died April 5, 1932 in Arkansas Valley, Oklahoma, at 73 years of age. Mother and Father of Henry Dedmon are JOHN Dedmon and HAGAN SMOOTON Dedmon. She was born in Georgia. It was not long until I realized that I did not know all the Dedmons in the State of Georgia. I do recall the excitement of finding Jim Dedmon in California and Danny McBee in North Carolina. Then there is the Florida family. We have had two reunions and I still don't even know all the decendants of my great grandfather. I created the web page so you could find me and that you have!!! I now have over 12,000 family members in my data-base. The earliest record dates to the year of 1440. We have almost almost 2,300 different surnames. Of course Dedmon has about five spelling variations. Little did I know there was so many of us.....*
