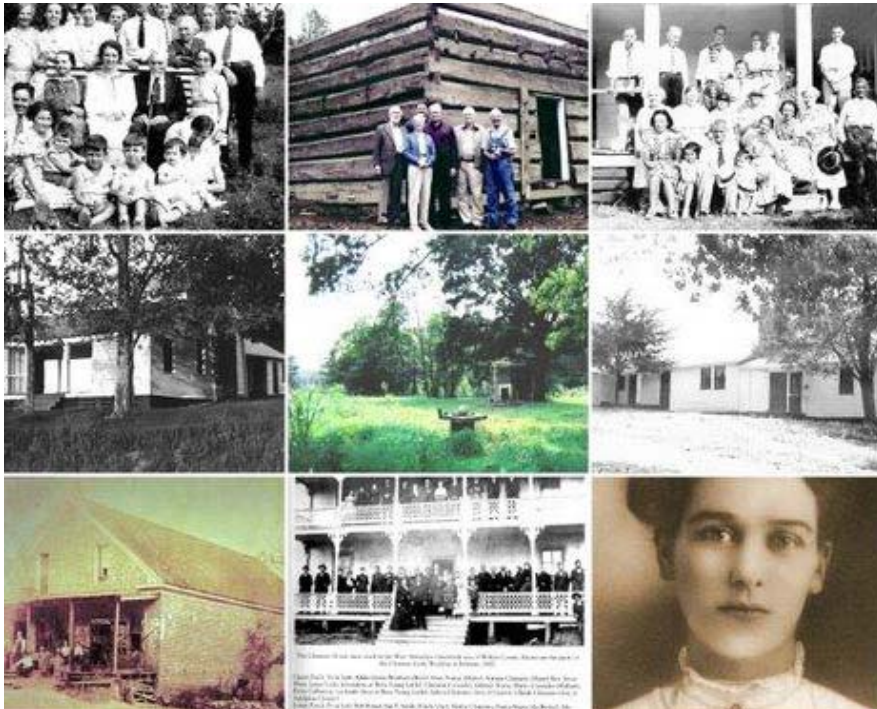


Down Memory Lane

Hi folks, The attached collage portrays a great deal of our Northwestern Georgia genealogy and history.

The original Park-Clements-Cavender log cabin homeplace is shown after more than a century's worth of coverings and additions had been stripped away for one last documentation by a number of our gathered cousins, before the dismantling of the logs. It is believed that the logs have been placed in storage by the Walker County Historical Association, until some day in the future that they will be reassembled to represent the typical home of the Cherokee Indians in the former Cherokee Indian Nation.



With me are Frank Clements Shaw, Jr., Llewellyn Chapman and his sister Jane, and Charles Clements, Jr., and Ben Reed, and the new owner of the homeplace, Mr. Tarvin of Villanow, Georgia.

I find it interesting to note that Frank Clements Shaw, Jr., is also shown as a very young boy in the group photo which was taken more than half a century earlier on the same grounds as he sits with his mother on the ground in the front row. His father Frank Clements Shaw is standing behind Mrs. Shaw.

To the photos right next to the Shaw family is located the Clements family. Mrs. Charles Clements, Sr. is shown with her two sons, Charles Clements, Jr. and his brother.

On the far right of the photo can be seen my Grandfather Judson Cicero Cavender standing by my Grandmother Flora Collins Cavender. The eldest gentleman sitting on the garden bench in the middle of the family portrait is Doctor Wilson Clements, who practiced medicine in the Armuchee area for many years after his four years as an Assistant Surgeon in the Confederate Army during the War Between the States.

The Park-Clements-Cavender family members had gathered to celebrate Dr. Wilson Clements 90+ birthday. Dr. Wilson Clements was one of seven sons of Dr. Adam Clements and Mary Wilson Hill Park Clements, who were our ancestors who bought the log cabin home from a Mr. Oglesby back when that part of Georgia was still the Cherokee Nation.

All seven of the Clements sons served in the Confederate Army, and three of them as Assistant Surgeons, and one, Judson Claudius Clements who served about four terms in the Congress of the United States of America,

when he wrote and introduced legislation which created the Interstate Commerce Commission, of which he served as its Chairman, after retiring from Congress.

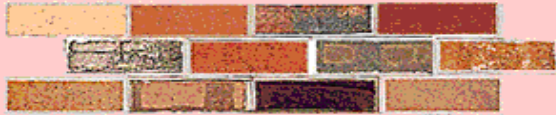
The sister, Martha "Mattie" Almina Clements, married Joseph Warren Cavender, who is pictured standing on the front porch of the Cavender's Villanow General Store. He can be seen with a vest and tie in a dress shirt, along with fellow citizens of Villanow. Of course, the single photo of the beautiful young lady gives us a wonderful look at Flora Velma Collins Cavender, who was the mother of Benjamin Warren, Martha Eleanor, Joseph Judson, and Robert Collins Cavender. The Judson and Flora Cavender family moved from Villanow to La Fayette, Georgia in 1920, where they located their family of six on

Villanow Street about two blocks from the La Fayette Cemetery, where they are at eternal rest in peace.

And the home with the two story porch is that of another Clements family in Armuchee, Georgia, upon the marriage of a Mr. Clements and a Miss Little. Standing on the front porch as a young boy, just to the right of a white porch column on the first story is little Judson Cicero Cavender.

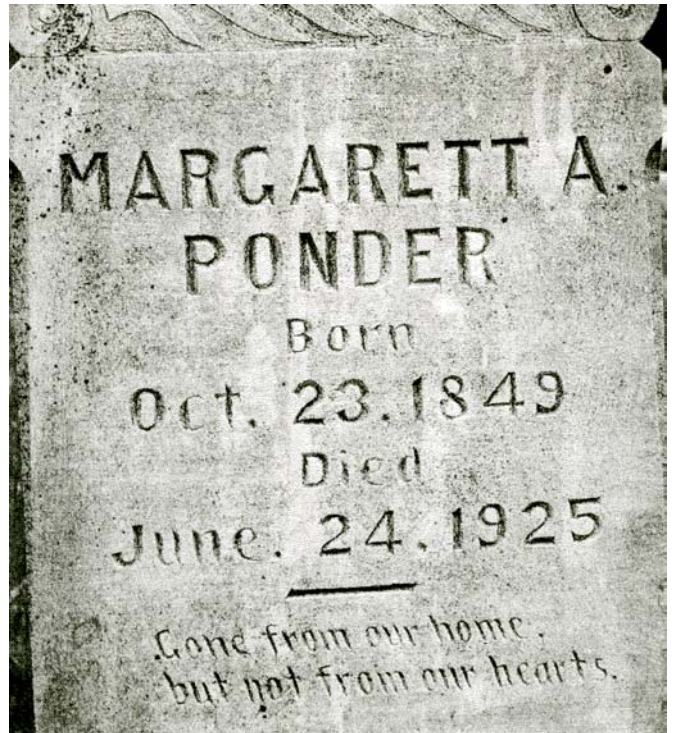

Subject: Thomas A. Ponder and Margaret Dedmon

Thomas Arthur (TA) Ponder was one of the first eleven Dedmon's to moved to Waldron, Scott County, Arkansas in 1869/70 after Mark L Dedmon was murdered. He married Mark L Dedmon's daughter Margaret Ann (Peggy) Dedmon March 5, 1869 in Catoosa County, Georgia. Margaret has been moving her grave to different locations in the Dedmon Cemetery on Taylor's Ridge for many years, she has to be the best witch of all time, because she has now moved her grave to Hoyt Cemetery, Haskell County, Oklahoma. Thomas and Margaret had fourteen children with nine living to adulthood. They had sixty grandchildren born before they died. In 1889 they moved from Hickman, Waldron, Scott County, Arkansas to Choctaw Nation, Indian Territory which later became Hoyt, Oklahoma. Their youngest son Frost Starr Ponder was born there in 1890, he was named after Cherokee Indian Frost Starr who was a brother-in-law to Belle Starr the outlaw. Belle Starr was killed in Hoyt, Oklahoma February 3, 1889 about the time Thomas and Margaret moved there. Younger Bend where Belle would hide the Younger's and the James's was only a short distance from Hoyt, Oklahoma. Mike Ponder a descendent of Thomas and Margaret who still lives in Hoyt, Oklahoma gave me this information. -Tim



I appreciate all the good work Tim does on the research of the Dedmon Family. His persistence in looking for facts after some of us have given up is of great benefit. The story has been passed from generation to generation that Peggy Dedmon was a "witch". One of the mystifying events is the supposed moving of her grave from time to time. She does have a grave marker on Taylor's Ridge at Mt. Nebo. So given the above information we must conclude this Peggy is not the "witch". This leaves us with the question of the identity of our famous ancestor. One "off the cuff" answer would be the grandmother of this Peggy, whose name was Margaret. We do know several of Margaret's family members are buried at Mt. Nebo.

NEBO MOUNTAIN (DEDMON) CEMETERY Catoosa County Georgia

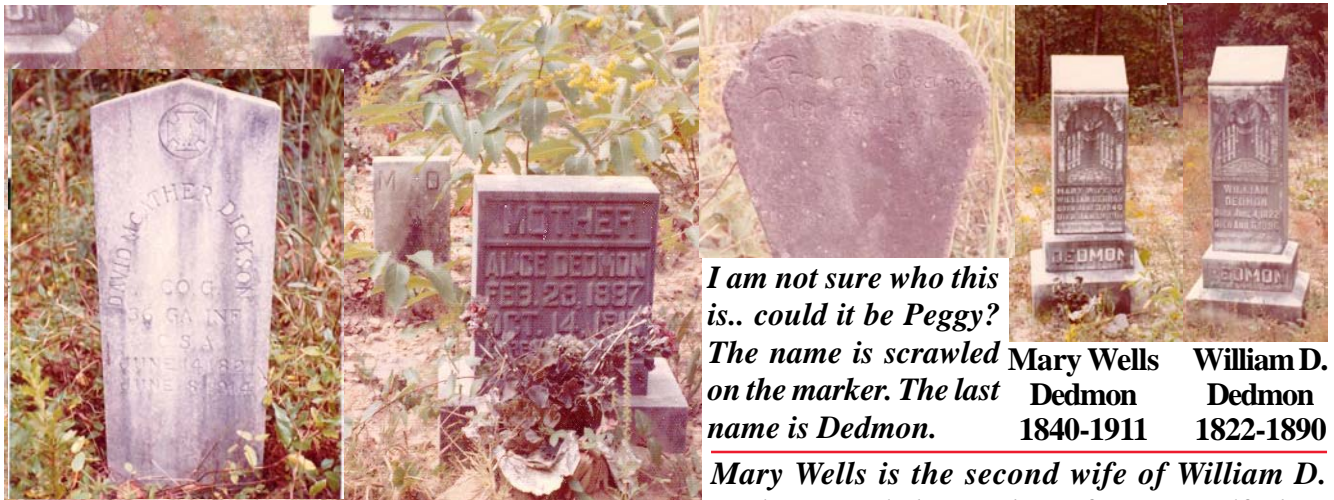
Nestled on Taylor's Ridge in the southwest corner of Catoosa County is the old family cemetery. Most folks simply call it the Dedmon Cemetery, but other places have it listed as Nebo Mountain or Mt. Nebo. I have been there three or four times. The last journey was at the Dedmon Reunion, which I believe was 2000. It is only about 2 miles as the crow flies from my house. However as the crow walks is a different story. It is in the wilderness and is becoming more difficult to reach. Plans are to make a visit soon. I am sure there is much work to be done. I remember seeing the marker for Peggy Dedmon (the witch), but it is not listed on the following page. So who knows.. Arkansas maybe!!!



NEBO MOUNTAIN (DEDMON) CEMETERY

Record of know burials in this family cemetery. Some graves are unmarked. Some are marked with field stones. The cemetery is located in Houston Valley, on what is now private property and access to the cemetery is limited. There is a rough road and fence that makes entrance difficult. This cemetery was maintained through the years by Gordon Black, A.T. (Tuck) Peters and Gordon Dedmon. Tuck Peters and Gordon Dedmon are deceased and Gordon Black in a nursing home in Dalton, GA. There is a lock on the gate and no one seems to know where to locate the key. The following list was compiled by Gordon Black several years ago. Frederick Hambright

Frederick Hambright (May 1, 1727 - March 9, 1817) was a Revolutionary War officer who fought in the North Carolina militia from 1777 to 1780.

Frederick Hambright was born on May 1, 1727 in Germany. He lived there for eleven years with his father, Conrad Hambrecht, until they immigrated to Lancaster County, PA on the ship, *St. Andrew* on October 27, 1738. Then, in 1755, Hambright moved to Virginia, where he married his first wife, Sarah Hardin. Then, in 1760, Hambright moved to Tryon County, North Carolina and settled near the fort built near the Catawba River. Near the start of the Revolutionary War, Hambright moved to Lincoln County, North Carolina. Hambright also represented Tryon County in the Third Provincial Congress in 1775 and was a signer of the Tryon Resolves of 1775, along with his brother-in-law, Col. Joseph Hardin.

In 1777, Hambright joined the War as Lieutenant Colonel of the Lincoln County troops (South Fork Boys). Early in his career, Hambright became known for his work on the local Loyalist groups. When the Battle of King's Mountain occurred in 1780, the Lincoln County troops were sent to battle. Since their regular commanding officer, Col. William Graham, wasn't present at the time, Hambright took command. In battle, Hambright was severely wounded from a musket ball wound in his thigh. Though he lost much blood, soldier Samuel Moore reported, "he knew he was wounded but was not sick or faint from the loss of blood-said he could still ride very well, and therefore deemed it his duty to fight on till the battle was over". After the battle, Hambright was taken by his soldiers to his nearby log cabin for treatment. Hambright survived, but had to resign from service due to his injury. That injury inflicted a limp in Hambright's walk, which he kept for the rest of his life.

Before he resigned, Hambright's first wife died. After resigning, Hambright married Mary Dover on July 17, 1781. Dover was at Hambright's log cabin while he was being treated for injury, and reportedly helped him recover afterwards. Hambright died in his log cabin on March 9, 1817 in York, North Carolina.

I am descended from Mary Dover through the Templeton-Greene connection. My gg grandmother married Frances Hambright, daughter of Lawson B. and Britter Holly Whisenant Hambright. Family Tree Maker says I am the 5th great-grandson of Col. Fredrick Hambright.
