There have been numerous times when I have been asked if I was related to the folk who owned the Beaumont Inn in Harrodsburg, Ky. Of course in the early days of my life I was only kin to my immediate family and some of them were questionable. The same was true when I lived in Manchester, TN and became acquainted with the Deadman Funeral Home. I just did not realize at the time spelling didn't count when it came to surnames.

I have been intrigued by the name Dixon Dedmon from the first time I saw the name. I suppose this is due to the fact that my maternial grandfather was George Dickson (Dixon). Although he spelled it Dickson, my grandmother put Dixon on his tombstone. Several other family members changed the spelling for various reasons. One of my ancestors was called Calvin Dedmon Dickson.

### History At a Glance

You can go to: *http://www.beaumontinn.com* for a complete history of this famous structure. However I will give you a *"cooks tour"* here and now.

Constructed in 1845, the building which is now the Main Inn was a school for young ladies. It was owned by Dr. Samuel Mullins, known as Greenville Institute until 1855.

For the next forty years, the school was known as Daughters College, under the direction of Mr. John Augustus Williams, former president of the University of Kentucky. In 1894, the school was bought by Colonel Thomas Smith, veteran of the army of the Confederate States of America. The school operated as Beaumont College until 1916. It was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Glave Goddard in 1917 and converted by them into the Beaumont Inn two years later. Now, almost a century afterward, descendants of the Goddards continue to refine the art of southern hospitality. Here in a park-like setting of centuries-old forest trees, serenely remote from the cares of the worka-day world, the fourth and fifth generations of the family now open the doors of The Beaumont Inn to welcome guests to their heritage and hospitality.

The Dedman family became involved when Pauline Bell Goddard married Thomas Curry Dedman, Sr. in 1906. Pauline followed her mother as innkeeper, followed by her son Thomas "Bud" Curry Dedman, Jr. and his wife Mary Elizabeth Ransdell Dedman. Their son, Charles "Chuck" Minor Dedman and his wife, Helen Williams Dedman became the fourth generation innkeepers and their son, Samuel Dixon Dedman, with his wife Elizabeth joins them as the fifth generation, making Beaumont Inn Kentucky's oldest family-operated country inn.

Beaumont Inn, a Kentucky Landmark

MARY ELIZABETH DEDMAN Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Ransdell Dedman, 79, of 618 Beaumont Drive, died Sunday, August 17, 1997 at the James B. Haggin Memorial Hospital. She was born July 4, 1918 in Mercer County to the late Minor and Alma Campbell Ransdell. She was a well known and highly respected member of the community, a native of Mercer County, and a 1940 graduate from Centre College, with a teaching degree. She taught primary school for one year before turning her full attention to the tasks that would define her life; that of wife, mother, a member of the Harrodsburg United Presbyterian Church and co-owner and operater of one of the most famous historic attractions in Harrodsburg, The Beaumont Inn.

The Beaumont Inn, a former girls' school, was purchased by her husband's family and she and her husband along with their children transformed it into an internationally renowned country inn. "Her life was devoted to her family," said daughter-in-law Helen Dedman. "Her husband, five children and Beaumont Inn became her career." Mrs. Dedman and husband of 57 years, Thomas Curry "Bud" Dedman, Jr., were involved in various aspects of Harrodsburg community life over the years.

Bud Dedman was one of the founders of the Fort Harrod Drama and the couple was very actively involved in the support of the Harrodsburg Band while their children were in school. Mrs. Dedman escorted the band on numerous performance trips across the country and the Dedman home was always open to those students and parents, said daughter-in-law Elaine Dedman.

Mrs. Dedman was also very active in the Harrodsburg United Presbyterian Church where she was a member and served on various improvement and beautification committees. In her later years, Mrs. Dedman limited her activities to those she loved the most; enjoying her 11 grandchildren, enlarging her impressive collection of Rookwood pottery and pigs, and gardening. "She loved her collecting with a passion," said daughter Anne Hunt. "She had a very green thumb and an ability to give incredible care to all living things."

Those who were closest to Mrs. Dedman, fondly known as "Ma'am" to family and friends, recall her sharp sense of humor, her innate good taste and her utter devotion to her family as the essence of her life. "Ma'am was the epitome of Southern gentility," said Erin Milburn, former Beaumont Inn employee. "She adored her family and took the utmost pride in their every accomplishment. She relished her role as wife, mother, grandmother and matriarch of Beaumont Inn and lived as a testament to the traditional values of home and hearth. "She was truly a woman of class and distinction and she will be greatly missed by all who knew and loved her."

Survivors include: her husband, Thomas Curry "Bud" Dedman, Jr., Harrodsburg; three sons, Dr. Thomas C. Dedman III, Louisville, Dr. Nick G. Dedman and Charles M. "Chuck" Dedman, both of Harrodsburg; two daughters, Libby Dedman Young and Anne Dedman Hunt, both of Louisville; 11 grandchildren. Funeral services were conducted Wednesday, August 20th at the Harrodsburg United Presbyterian Church with Rev. Leslie Rust officiating. Burial was in Spring Hill Cemetery. # THOMAS CURRY "BUD" DEDMAN, JR.

Thomas Curry "Bud" Dedman, Jr., age 87, 618 Beaumont Inn Drive, widower of the late Mary Elizabeth Ransdell Dedman, died Friday evening at the James B. Haggin Memorial Hospital after an illness. Born December 12, 1915 in Mercer County, he was the son of the late Thomas C. Dedman, Sr. and Pauline Goddard Dedman.

He was a 1938 graduate of Centre College with a BA Degree in English and a member of the Beta Theta Phi Fraternity and received the Distinguished Alumnus Award in 2001. As a former Centre graduate and a parent of graduates, he claimed one of his greatest accomplishments was to have had four of his five children to graduate from Centre College and also a former and current Centre grandparent. Every year the 50th, 55th, and 60th Centre College class reunions were held at Beaumont Inn. He also recently served as host for the Vice Presidential Debate moderator Bernard Shaw. He was the owner, proprietor and President of Beaumont Inn Corporation.

Mr. Dedman was a U.S. Navy veteran of World War II. Throughout his lifetime he worked to establish Beaumont Inn, which has been owned and operated by his family since 1919 and founded by his grandfather the late Glave Goddard, as Kentucky's most celebrated hospitality landmark and was the third generation in his family to run the Inn. Many of the dishes served at the Inn are from Mr. Dedman's grandmother. Beaumont Inn is known for Mr. Dedman's own cured country ham. He and the Inn have been featured in several major hospitality publications, such as Duncan Hines' Adventures in Good Eating, Gourmet Magazine, Bon Appetit magazine, Southern Living Magazine, Life Magazine, Redbook Magazine, the New York Times, the Los Angeles Times, the Kentucky Advocate Magazine, and numerous other publications.

In 1979, he and his wife were honored at the Kentuckians Club in New York City with a traditional Kentucky dinner featuring Beaumont Inn recipes. KET and PBS did a feature on Mr. Dedman promoting the history, production, and lore of Kentucky Country Hams. He was the founder of Fort Harrod Drama Productions which is Kentucky's second longest running summer outdoor theater and was former President of Fort Harrod Productions for 12 years, a former Board of Directors member for the Kentucky State Chamber of Commerce, a former member of the Board of Directors for the Kentucky River Task Force, was named a Kentucky Colonel in 1963 and was a member of the United Presbyterian Church in Harrodsburg.

Survivors include three sons, Dr. Thomas P. Dedman, III and his wife Debbe of Louisville, Dr. Nick Dedman and his wife Elaine, Harrodsburg, and Chuck Dedman and his wife Helen also of Harrodsburg; one daughter Libby Dedman Young and her husband Van, Lexington; one sister Anne Dedman Cherry, Harrodsburg, twelve

grandchildren and seven great grandchildren. He was preceded in death by a daughter, Anne Dedman Hunt.

Funeral services will be conducted 2:00 PM Tuesday at the United Presbyterian Church by Doug Slagle; burial will be in the Springhill Cemetery. Visitation will be held Monday evening from 4:00 PM until 8:00 PM at Beaumont Inn and after 12:00 noon at the Church. Pallbearers are Scott Hunt, Jr., John Dedman, S. Dixon Dedman, Jake Heustis, Mark Peeler, Dave Monaco, Chris Watkins, and Anthony Pollio. Honorary bearers are Bob, Bill, Tom, Pete, and Johnny Baughman. 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#### **DEWAYNE DEDMON**

I have followed Dewayn's basketball career with interest for the past few years as there have been very few Dedmons in professional sports. -Leroy

He attended Lancaster High School in Lancaster, CA, but did not play high school basketball for the Eagles until his senior year, due to religious reasons.



Dewayne's mother raised him and his two sisters in the Antelope Valley as a single mother and a devout Jehovah's Witness. Although young Dewayne was tall and athletic and energetic growing up, his mother wanted his time and energy focused elsewhere, and

did not want him participating in sports. Each year of high school Dewayne tried out for the basketball team, each year he made the team, and each year his mother told him he was not allowed to play. This went on until he was an 18 year old senior, at which point the son exercised his right as an adult to go against the wishes of his mother and he remained on the team. He was 6'8" and physically gifted, but had never played the game before, and spent the season riding the bench. For his entire high school career, Dedmon scored 2 points.

Following graduation in 2008, he attended Antelope Valley as a part-time student. He did not play basketball during the 2008–09 season. In 2009–10, he helped the Antelope Valley Marauders to a 17–14 record while averaging 6.6 points and 7.8 rebounds per game. In 2010, he transferred to the University of Southern California. After redshirting the 2010–11 season due to NCAA transfer rules, he battled through injuries throughout the 2011–12 season which curtailed his development. In his major college debut, he scored 16 points for the USC Trojans in their season opening win over Cal State Northridge. It's just the most recent step in an amazing journey that may well take Dewayne Dedmon all the way to the NBA. In 20 games (all starts), he averaged 7.6 points and 5.5 rebounds per game. In 2012-13 as a redshirt junior, he appeared in 31 games (29 starts), averaging 6.7 ppg., 7.0 rpg., 2.13 bpg. and 1.10 spg. in 22.3 mpg. He led the Trojans in rebounding and blocked shots. he played 31 games, averaging 6.7 points, 7.0 rebounds, and 2.1 blocks per game

After going undrafted in the 2013 NBA draft, he joined the Miami Heat for the Orlando Summer League and the Dallas Mavericks for the Las Vegas Summer League. On September 23, 2013, he signed with the Golden State Warriors. The rest of 2013 he "bounced" back and forth between Golden State and Santa Cruz Warriors.



On January 14, 2014, he signed a 10-day contract with the Philadelphia 76ers. On January 15, Dedmon made his debut for the 76ers. In 14 minutes of play, he recorded 7 rebounds and 2 blocks in a 95-92 win over the Charlotte Bobcats. On January 24, 2014, he signed a second 10-day contract with the 76ers. He was subsequently not signed for the rest of season after his second 10-day contract expired.



On February 3, 2014, he was named to the Futures All-Star roster for the 2014 NBA D-League All-Star Game. On February 4, 2014, he was re-acquired by the Santa Cruz Warriors. On February 25, 2014, he signed with the Orlando Magic. In the Magic's preseason

game against the Indiana Pacers, he collected four boards and blocked one shot in 15 minutes.

Dedmon is the player with the talent to be a difference maker. He's come a long way from a 2 point high school basketball career. How much further he can go remains to be seen. But one thing is for certain - he'll enjoy every minute of it.
